CEO/GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

What an extraordinary year it has been particularly as it is also our 75th year of service to youth, continuing the legacy established by Olive Johnston back in 1947. We emerged from COVID lockdown in November 2021 moving forward cautiously and carefully, rebuilding our activities, and ensuring that St Kilda PCYC continued to be a welcoming, inclusive, and safe place for members, our staff, and our community.

The Pandemic significantly affected so many people, businesses, and the economy overall. As a registered charity we rely heavily on the support of all our members and our donors and are grateful for the support given.

We faced many challenges during the year but are proud of the achievements. Our major event was our 75th Year Anniversary Open Day in October that saw over 200 people come through the doors to enjoy activities on offer. These included boxing exhibitions, a silent auction, appetite inducing BBQ and the fantastic Concert that featured a host of talented artists, including our very own Gym & Rooming House Manager, Donny Pelsoczy. Youth activities included an inflatable obstacle course, henna art and face paint. A wonderful and inspiring day for all.

Following its successful launch last year, a highlight was seeing Olive's Lane coffee shop offer the best coffee in the neighbourhood, provide training as baristas and hospitality industry skills for youth.

A major challenge was to encourage our youth participants to return to the fantastic array of youth programs that we provide. Our youth are inspiring and motivating and it is great to see them benefit through participation in the Youth Programs, delivered across several municipalities including the Cities of Port Phillip, Stonnington and Bayside.... for a small organisation, we spread widely and wisely.

All activities were promoted and featured in the very professional social media activities throughout the year, resulting in a strong group of followers. Given the financial impact of restrictions, we continue to rely heavily on your support and this year launched several fundraising campaigns to enable us to continue our work for youth and the community.

As 2022 was also a Federal Election Year and once again the Australian Electoral Commission asked us to provide our facility as a Polling Booth. We opened the Boxing Hall for voters in the area. Of course, the best part of election day at St Kilda PCYC was the fantastic

traditional Election Day Sausage Sizzle (democracy sausage!!!).

A special activity of the year was the receipt of a grant from the Lord Mayor's Charitable Foundation to conduct a Social Housing Feasibility Study into the options and possibilities available for our rooming house.

In all these achievements, people are our major support and resource -members, staff, our community. I am incredibly grateful to all the very generous donors who supported our fundraising initiatives making it possible for us to continue our work with youth and those in need. I am immensely proud of our staff and volunteers who have stepped up repeatedly to support PCYC. We are also fortunate in the strength, skill and commitment of our volunteer Board Members who give their time and hard work for the best interests of St Kilda PCYC.

It feels incredible to be back at full capacity with our Fitness Classes, Basketball Court, Gym, and Boxing Hall back in action. Our spacious and airy gym boasts well serviced and well-maintained equipment with an even more inviting and inclusive space to service our community. Over the past year we have continued to improve and following upgrades and repairs were made:

UPGRADES/REPAIRS

- > New belts and boards on two Life Fitness Treadmills
- New cables on all Life Fitness Cable Machines
- > Punch Body Rip Bag installed
- > Punch Water Bag installed
- > Punch Floor to Ceiling Ball installed
- > Re upholstering of all damaged gym benches and machine benches
- > Emergency Exit Lights have been repaired
- > 75 inch Television Installed in Cardio Area

PROMOTIONS

> **Silver Special** - In the month of June we offered a Silver Membership at the reduced rate of \$399 Full Fee and \$299 Concession.



Mother Day Special - During Mother Day we offered free gym access for our members mothers.



- Backpackers Deal Now that travel restrictions have lifted we are seeing far more backpacks in St Kilda so we offered a special monthly fee.
- > Sale of Boxing Merchandise and Equipment We have teamed up with Punch Boxing to offer our patrons a range of high quality boxing gloves and merchandise at competitive prices.

CLASSES

All of our fitness classes are included in Silver, Monthly and Direct Debit Memberships, Bronze members and nonmembers are charged \$10 per session.

- > HIIT (High Impact Interval
 Training) Offered twice weekly
 by Brooklynn and Tiff. This class
 continues to grow in popularity and
 provides a hard hitting intense full
 body workout for intermediate to
 advanced members.
- Circuit Slam Newly introduced this year was our fitness circuit class titled Circuit Slam. We transformed part of the Boxing Hall to facilitate this twelve-station sweat session.
- > Masters Three sessions are facilitated each week. This unique class has a cohort of over forty participants who are involved in this strength, fitness, balance, flexibility and

- functional movement classes designed for people over the age of fifty.
- > **Boxercise** A newly introduced boxing fitness-based class with all the skills and drills of a competitive boxing class minus the contact.
- > Stretch Each Saturday with Ginny this class has a loyal following and allows members to unwind and improve flexibility. This is a forty five minute full body stretch class that will help keep muscles flexible, strong, and healthy.



COMMUNITY CLASSES

Boxing For Parkinson's - We continue to be inspired and thoroughly impressed by the incredible participants of the Boxing for Parkinson's class. Twice weekly the group meets to take part in this functional strength, coordination and boxing fitness-based class.

- > CoPP Chair Class Tailored to members of our community who are less mobile, and designed to increase their strength, coordination and fitness.
- > Port Phillip Community Group
- Members of the Port Phillip Community Centre meet weekly to take part in a full body strength and fitness class led by one of our highly skilled and experienced trainers.



PASS CARDS

As part of our commitment to our community, we offer community service providers and community schools discounted pass cards to allow access to our Gymnasium. We have provided over two hundred entries to each of the following organisations this year:

FITNESS TEAM LEADER

Following many years of service to our club and community our Fitness Manager Lee Renfree decided to embark on her next chapter. She brought so many great ideas to the club one of which was the Boxing for Parkinson's class. Her initiative and commitment to St Kilda PCYC and its members will be sadly missed and we wish

her the very best in her future endeavours.

Our latest addition to the Fitness Coordinator role is the dynamic, and resourceful Brooklynn Baker. She may have large shoes to fill but her commitment to the club and its members is unquestionable. Brooklynn will now lead the Personal Trainer's and Fitness Class facilitators in offering a more comprehensive and lively set of classes.



ROOMING HOUSE REPORT

Only two doors down from St Kilda PCYC is our Youth Rooming House at 175 Inkerman Street. We offer six rooms at affordable rates to young people aged eighteen to twenty-five years. The front of the house has four rooms which are provide for young people through our agreement with the Salvation Army Crisis Centre in Upton Road St Kilda. Each of whom has a dedicated support worker who insures they are engaged in work or study and supports them with general life skills such as cooking, washing, cleaning, budgeting and applying for formal documentation.

The two rooms at the back of the house are managed by St Kilda PCYC and young people residing in those rooms are supported by us through engaging them in employment and training opportunities.

FEASIBILITY REPORT

Earlier this year we were fortunate enough to receive a grant from the Lord Mayors Charitable Foundation to conduct a feasibility study to look at the possibility of upgrading the current rooming house. This allowed us to engage with Brearley Architects and Urbanists in conjunction with David Saunders to work on a comprehensive report which looked at the possibilities of demolishing the current house and building a three level building to provide up to ten fully self-contained units for young people. The report was completed in October and now gives us the opportunity to consider the future of the rooming house.

OLIVE'S LANE REPORT

For many years the idea of creating a social enterprise coffee shop at St Kilda PCYC was discussed. The concept of providing workplace training opportunities to bridge the gap between young people and the work industry is something St Kilda PCYC felt passionately about.

Fast forward to August 2021 amidst the Covid lockdowns and we were opening the doors of our newest social enterprise, Olive's Lane named after our founder, Olive Johnston.

Over the past 12 months of trade, we have been able to connect with our community in a new and exciting way. This has led to creating strong bonds in our neighbourhood and a group of friendly regulars (and their pooches) whom we see on a daily basis. This experience has been humbling to say the least. Although it hasn't always been smooth sailing, we have had to stand in the face of ever-changing pandemic regulations, survive the teething phase as a new business, adapt our trading hours, persevere through all weather conditions, and push to stand out amongst the other coffeeshops in the area, however we are proud of what we have been able to

achieve. We know that we serve the best coffee in our neighbourhood.

As a youth-based registered charity our focus has been clear from the start, we need to provide support and training to young people in the area. Since Olive's Lanes humble beginning we have been able to provide workplace training and life changing skills to four young people, two of whom have gone on to continue their careers in hospitality, one opting to leave hospitality and explore other areas of work and another who is still working at Olive's Lane and thriving in every aspect of the word with ambitions to become a hospitality manager.

Looking to the future we hope to grow our community awareness and client base, install a grease trap that would allow us to start creating food onsite thus reducing the overall costs of operation. Furthermore, we will explore the options of aligning ourselves with a partner organization to provide accredited training and more learning opportunities. We have already achieved so much and there is a lot to be excited about in the future.

YOUTH REPORT

Two years of COVID-19 lockdown presented challenges youth could not have predicted. This year, our first year out of lockdowns, St Kilda PCYC focused on rebuilding programs, social connections, and wellbeing, for our young people.



St Kilda PCYC continued to create opportunities for young people to develop new skills and build the confidence that they need to thrive. There were many highlights for our youth this year including the Young Leaders Camp at The Grampians National Park and the Youth Performance at our 75th Year Anniversary Open Day.

MOBILE ACTIVITY CENTRE (MAC)

Our very popular MAC program engaged over 40 youth participants between our two locations – being the Horrace Petty Estate in Prahran and Park Towers in South Melbourne. Our youth workers attended the housing estates four times a week and set up structured activities for the youth residing in public housing. Activities included basketball, dodgeball,

and bike riding as well as teaching youth participants how to cook healthy meals.

YOUTH SPACE

In the last year, we have established a new drop-in session at St Kilda PCYC called Youth Space. This program is designed by youth, for youth. Each week the youth participants can decide what they want to achieve from the session, whether it is getting active, chilling out with friends, or working on homework. The youth workers are there to guide youth through this process. During Youth Space sessions we went to the Beach Volleyball courts in South Melbourne, ridden bikes around Alma Park, and planned our upcoming School Holiday and Camp activities.



GIRLS GROUP

Girls Groups is designed to be a safe space for girls to socialize and express themselves through creative activities. We have experimented with many arts and crafts this year with some activities being more successful than others, yet all a lot of fun. The girls have made candles, painted pot plants, baked brownies, and

participated in yoga. A highlight must be Halloween when the girls dressed up in costumes and went out trick or treating.



KOORIE YOUTH BOOTCAMP

St Kilda PCYC continued to host the Koorie Youth Bootcamp for a group of ten Indigenous youth from the Dandenong region. Police and Aboriginal Community Liaison Officer Stewart Taylor transported the youth to St Kilda each week for an hour of high intensity workouts and games facilitated by our personal trainer Laurance. Youth participants gained health, fitness, and social benefits from this weekly session. The same youth performed at our 75th Anniversary Open Day in October as the dancers of Bandok Tati.

YOUTH BOXING

Boxing based fitness and strength classes were a hit this year, with classes averaging 15 participants a session. Euguene Higham facilitated two sessions per week and volunteer Stuart supported youth with a particular interest in competitive boxing in a more focused Saturday morning class.

WICKED SCHOOLS PROGRAM

The Wicked Schools Program was facilitated at four schools during 2022-St Kilda Primary School, Windsor Primary School, Sandringham College, and Elwood Primary School. Our youth workers facilitated high energy lunchtime activities to keep the students engaged and focused during their afternoon classes. Most popular activities were dodgeball, basketball, and downball.



YOUNG LEADERS PROGRAM

10 young people attended our Young Leaders Program designed to challenge youth and give them life and leadership skills. Youth participated in beach cleanups and then took on the adventure of a four-day intensive leadership camp in The Grampians National Park. They camped in tents and participated in rock climbing, abseiling, kayaking, and a 10km hike. Each night the youth reflected on their day while the youth workers discussed the leadership skills that were practiced during the activities such as taking risks and encouraging friends.





SCHOOL HOLIDAY PROGRAM

The Summer and Winter school holidays were jammed packed with 12 different activities for the youth to attend. We had over 30 young people attend the School Holiday Program with activities ranging from Geelong Adventure Park, Bounce, Luna Park, and creating a new mural on our basketball court with well-known Street Artist Shem.



YOUTH GRAFFITI

Artist Shem has been running an 8-week Graffiti program to teach youth the fundamentals of street art. The final project will be held over two weekend sessions spraying painting and creating a mural in St Kilda.

MUSIC SESSIONS

Music engineer Dom Cork has been working one-on-one with youth aged 18 to 25 to create, record, and produce music. These studio sessions would not normally be affordable for young people however the music studio set up at St Kilda PCYC has been utilized to create these sessions free of charge for youth

ST KILDA FESTIVAL

St Kilda PCYC presented the Youth St Kilda Festival on the 5th of February to celebrate local and indigenous youth. We worked alongside Indigenous Outreach Projects to create a youth hip-hop display and hosted a 3-on-3 basketball competition with prizes. Aunty Jaco joined us on the day to perform an acknowledgment of country ceremony and educate our youth about the land and indigenous culture.

75TH ANNIVERSARY OPEN DAY

Our very own youth participants Ayen and Christina performed a stand-up comedy routine in front of a live audience at the St Kilda PCYC 75th Anniversary Open Day. They both bravely overcame their nerves and told hilarious stories about their childhood and living with strict parents. We couldn't be prouder of these girls.

SOCIAL MEDIA REPORT

During lockdown and following reopening in November 2021, we have intensified and grown our social media activities. Our social media has been continually active with a strong focus on growth and communication. We are constantly looking to improve our online presence. Some of these improvements completed this year include:

ACTIVITY

Over the last year the St Kilda PCYC has seen an increase in the need for an online presence due to the demand for connectivity relating to the Covid-19 Pandemic. We achieved this by increasing the number of posts made per week and the quality of content and imaging. Over the previous 12 months we have made a total of 209 posts averaging a minimum of four posts per week. This has allowed us to maintain a high level of contact with our members and keep the community updated on important matters.

GROWTH

Growth on social media is always essential as it lets us know that we are extending our reach and ability to help and raise awareness in our community. Growth is stimulated by maintaining these three key elements:

Content - What kind of posts do our Audience want to see, and this tends to change over time.

- > Engagement Are we asking the right questions, stimulating conversation, responding to our community? It comes down to the age old saying "you get what you give"
- Consistency How often are we posting, what days and times and are we posting a good variety of captivating content, as you can tell from our number of posts this past year, we are definitely ticking these boxes.

Overall, this year we have seen an increase in organic growth gaining a further 153 followers since October 2021. Organic growth is slow and requires time and effort but overall, these are impressive results.

MEET Layla

Olive's Lane Trainee

Layla was first introduced to St Kilda PCYC when she was fourteen years old through her brother who was a youth participant in our youth programs at the time. She first began attending School Holiday Programs as it gave her a safe place to where she felt accepted. Our Youth staff treated everyone equally and this made Layla feel comfortable, she says "the community was really good, it was really inclusive and no matter where you came from or what you were doing you could still come to PCYC and no one would look at you differently". As a result, Layla became actively involved in the St Kilda PCYC youth programs.

Layla enjoyed her time as a participant on our Girls Group program. The program's initiative is to empower young girls to express their creativity, take on new challenges and nurture their selfbelief whilst being supported as they transition into adulthood. In addition to this, Layla was able to build strong friendships that last to this day.

Over the years Layla grew up and went her own way but finally returned to St Kilda PCYC looking for work and was able to find a trainee placement at our social enterprise, Olive's Lane coffee shop. Layla had struggled to find a workplace in which she felt comfortable, until she started her traineeship with us. Since becoming a staff member Layla's confidence has grown considerably and it didn't take her long to find her feet and master the art of being a barista and providing customer service. She now can work her own independent shifts and it is a rewarding experience to watch her grow and develop. The benefits of the learnings go beyond just making coffee, Layla's social anxiety has been at an all-time low and she enjoys having a routine, earning her own income and the positive social element that working at Olive's Lane provides.

We think Layla has a very bright future ahead of her. She tells us she is working towards her goals of being able to train young people to work at Olive's Lane, become a hospitality Manager whilst she chases her dreams of becoming an actor.
